Title: Genesis 13.1-9

Abram and Lot Have Strife

Thank you for joining me today from wherever you are and by however you listen as we meet together coast-to-coast here in the United States and all the way around the world. We are back now, after the weekend, to our ongoing series God and Abraham. Our focus is on Holy God in the context of the remarkable life of this man Abraham. When we last spoke of him we were in Genesis chapter 12 and you may remember that Abram (his name has not yet been changed to Abraham), Abram, his wife Sarai (her name not yet changed to Sarah), Abram, Sarai, and Abram's nephew Lot, Abram's people and possessions had made the round trip down into Egypt from the promised land of Canaan and back again. Genesis chapter 13 and verse 1 says, "So Abram went up from Egypt to the Negev, he and his wife and all that belonged to him, and Lot with him."

So that at Genesis 13, verse 1 Abram and company are back in Canaan, which is where God had put them in the first place and right where God wanted them all along. Abram had certainly learned that lesson! Before we proceed, this is a good time to remind you of the God Is Podcast. On this broadcast and podcast you will find that I do not constantly remind you of this, nor do I ever ask for money. Never. Our focus is on who the Scripture presents God to be. Our time is short, so I want to get in as much Bible as possible. Prayerfully, and excitedly, let's return to God and Abraham in Genesis chapter 13. The reality is, because our time is so short, we will not be able to cover every chapter and verse in Abraham's life. So, I will need discernment to decide what to focus on in the days ahead. And I am eager to move us along in chapter 14 of the Genesis, but in order to do that, so that we fully understand what chapter 14 is all about, we do need to pause in this thirteenth chapter to capture something significant. Join me, if you have your Bible handy, in Genesis 13 and what I will do is to read for a bit, then pause and give comment, then read some more. We will carry this into tomorrow.

As I always do, I read from the New American Standard Bible (the NASB, 1995 edition). Genesis 13, beginning in verse 1, "So Abram went up from Egypt to the Negev, he and his wife and all that belonged to him, and Lot with him. ² Now Abram was very rich in livestock, in silver and in gold. ³ He went on his journeys from the Negev as far as Bethel, to the place where his tent had been at the beginning, between Bethel and Ai, ⁴ to the place of the altar which he had made there formerly; and there Abram called on the name of the Lord." (Genesis 13, verses 1-4.)

Here, I want to comment on geography. Abram and his companions are escorted out of Egypt – them, their livestock, silver and gold. So they caravan their way back up towards the north and across the boundary into Canaan, across the Negev (or the south country) and as far as Bethel. That is where Abram was in Genesis 12 and verse 8 and you may remember that we talked about him building an altar and worshiping God there. Bethel was on the west and Ai on the east. Alas, here he is again. The altar is there and Abram again calls upon the name of the Lord. From within the confines of the promised land, Abram communes with God.

The other thing to note from verses 1-4 of Genesis 13 is that Lot is still with Abram. Abram is Lot's uncle, but in the text he is spoken of as Abram's brother, meaning a close family connection. OK, with that said, I am now reading again in Genesis 13, verses 5-9. "5 Now Lot, who went with Abram, also had flocks and herds and tents. 6 And the land could not sustain them while dwelling together, for their possessions were so great that they were not able to remain together. 7 And there was strife between the herdsmen of Abram's livestock and the herdsmen of Lot's livestock. Now the Canaanite and the Perizzite were dwelling then in the land.

⁸ So Abram said to Lot, 'Please let there be no strife between you and me, nor between my herdsmen and your herdsmen, for we are brothers. ⁹ Is not the whole land before you? Please separate from me; if *to* the left, then I will go to the right; or if *to* the right, then I will go to the left."

Ah, we are dealing here with human beings. And you know from personal experience what happens when people get involved with other people, well, there is conflict! The Bible here calls this "strife." There is a disagreement, a quarrel, some wrangling between Abram and Lot's colleagues. And notice, I read this in verse 7, that the Canaanites and the Perizzites were dwelling in this same land. And these were pagan peoples. So, watching the bickering between Abram and Lot's herdsmen are these Canaanites and Perizzites. Now what kind of a witness is this to them of who God is?

Abram and Lot are brothers, that is they are men who are closely related to one another and they have a common tie in Jehovah, the Lord God. Abram and Lot are God's people. And now they have strife right out in the open in front of godless people. Well, this is fast becoming a poor witness to the God who commands that we love one another. So, Abram takes action, and he says to Lot, let's not have any more of this strife. Let's separate. You go your way and I will go my way.

And then Abram does something very noble, which highlights both his humility and his faith in God.

And we will find out what this is tomorrow. In preparation, read for yourself, or catch this on an audible Bible, Genesis chapter 13. It is just 18 verses. Genesis 13. As we pause here, consider strife that you may be having with another brother or sister in Christ. How is that conflict being played out in front of unbelievers? As Abram leads by example, we will be wise to find a way to swiftly resolve this disagreement so that our testimony of a loving God will be on display. So take action and join me tomorrow for God Is.
